
### NEIGHBORHOOD SPRUCE-UP PROGRAM 2025



#### Neighborhood Spruce-Up Overview

- \$7,500 \$20,000 capital grants to fund public space improvements in Southeast and East Baltimore neighborhoods.
- Enables smaller community groups and individuals to have an impact on neighborhood revitalization.
- Modeled after a successful program developed by the Central Baltimore Partnership.
- Funded by the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development's Baltimore Regional Neighborhood Initiative.

- Contribute to building a critical mass of long-lasting, high-impact improvements in public spaces.

## Project for Public Spaces


#### Placemaking

- Inspires people to collectively reimagine and reinvent public spaces as the heart of every community.
- Facilitates creative patterns of use, paying particular attention to the physical, cultural, and social identities that define a place and support its ongoing evolution.
- Capitalizes on a local community's assets, inspiration, and potential, and it results in the creation of quality public spaces that contribute to people's health, happiness, and well being.



#### **PROGRAM SPECIFICS**

#### Who's eligible?

Individuals, community associations and non-profits.

The applicant must have a 501c3 designation, or use a 501c3 as a fiscal agent.

A fiscal agent is an organization that manages financial and administrative tasks on behalf of another party.

#### What's eligible?

Projects must be accessible to the public, on land that you have legal rights to use.

Projects must have an expected life span of at least 20 years.

#### What's eligible?

Capital costs only. Spruce-Up funds cannot support operating costs.

Capital costs are things that do no move from the site, such as paint, artist's time, planters, plants, benches, light fixtures

Operating cost examples: staff time, permits for events, stipends for youth, conceptual design drawings (not related to final installation), tools

#### What's eligible?

Projects must include planning, development, and other forms of engagement by community residents, groups, or organizations.

Engagement could include surveys, public voting, volunteer days, design charrettes with neighbors, art designed or made by youth, etc.

Proposals that include committed matching funds will receive priority in the grant review process.

#### Spruce-Up 2025 Timeline

 Please submit any final questions by Friday, May 23, 2025, 9am

Applications due by Monday, May 30, 2025

Project period: June 30, 2025-June 15, 2026
 Projects that can be completed by December 1, 2025 will receive priority ranking.

• Final report due: June 30, 2026

#### **Spruce-Up Spending Guidelines**

Southeast CDC can pay for project costs by paying your contractors directly or reimbursing you for expenses.

#### Project planning tips

Site Control: private property vs. city property, city right of way

Budget: one time costs, ongoing costs

Fundraising: "capital" or not? - donations/crowdfunding, grants

Implementation: contractor, volunteers

Celebration: ribbon cutting, community gathering

Evaluation: document everything for reporting

#### Project planning tips

#### Obtaining site control

**Public property**: requires permission from owner (Rec & Parks, Housing, DPW) which could take many months, and must use approved contractors

Private property: requires permission from the owner


#### Project type

Greening: ongoing maintenance plan

**Changes to buildings**: Maryland Historical Trust review for any changes to buildings, including murals and lighting

Installation: professional or volunteers?

# PROJECT EXAMPLES & RESOURCES

#### Amazing Port Street Commons Gating Project



**Site:** Greenspace owned by the community land trust, but gating alleys requires permission from the City and abutting property owners

**Project Management**: Amazing Grace Lutheran Church staff member

**Spruce-Up Funding**: \$12,000 for gates and lockboxes

**Timeline:** Took over a year to collect property owner permissions, go through the City's alley gating process, and install the gates

#### Greektown Sculpture



**Site:** Median owned by Department of Transportation; requires "Right of Way Art" approval and typical permits for construction


**Project Management**: board members of the Greektown Neighborhood Association


**Construction Management:** Dominic Terlizzi (artist selected through public process)


Spruce-Up Funding: \$23,000

**Timeline:** Initiated July 2018, completed February 2020 (It takes lots of time to go through the city's review and process checks to get the sculpture fabrication started!)

#### QUESTIONS

#### **Questions from session**

- Can Spruce-Up funds be used for ground murals? Yes BRNI funds have been used for ground murals, provided they are installed by a professional artists who takes precautions to prepare the ground and use proper primer and traffic paint
- If an organization already has a project funded through MD DHCD, can they apply for Spruce-Up funds? Yes!
- Who will manage the Maryland Historic Trust process? Southeast CDC will send your project proposals to MHT. Feel free to submit your locations to us ahead of time to be vetted (especially if they are murals).
- Are these State or Federal funds? State funds
- Can we add planters to an alley? Potentially yes, but we may require you to seek approval from DOT to block an alley, depending on the placement and need for emergency access to the alley
- Can we pay for cameras to monitor illegal dumping? Not with Spruce-Up funds
- **Plants** Spruce-Up can pay for perennials but not annuals
- Can we install a bus shelter? Yes! You will need to coordinate with MTA for location approval
